Bios:

Gavin Harris, MD

Gavin H. Harris, MD is an Assistant Professor of Medicine at Emory University School of Medicine, holding appointments in both the Division of Pulmonary, Allergy and Critical Care Medicine and the Division of Infectious Diseases. He has been on faculty at Emory since 2020 and his professional expertise lies in the areas of disaster preparedness, medical countermeasures, and the treatment of special pathogens. Dr. Harris is the Director of Education and Outreach for the Emory University Serious Communicable Diseases Program Project ECHO and SitRep, the co-clinical lead for critical care medicine for Emory's Serious Communicable Diseases Unit (SCDU), and a rostered physician for the SCDU. Additionally, Dr. Harris is an alumni fellow of the Johns Hopkins University Bloomberg School of Public Health's Center for Health Security Emerging Leaders in Biosecurity Initiative (ELBI) as well as faculty with the National Emerging Special Pathogens Training and Education Center (NETEC) as an adult care subject matter expert and a biothreats subject matter expert with the Southern Regional Disaster Response System (SRDRS).

Anna Yaffee, MD, MPH



Dr. Anna Q. Yaffee is an Associate Professor of Emergency Medicine, practicing clinically at Grady Memorial and Emory University Hospitals. She serves as the Emergency Medicine liaison to the Emory Serious Communicable Diseases Unit and assists with frontline serious communicable disease preparedness for the Emory Healthcare system as well as nationally through the National Emerging Special Pathogens Training and Education Center.

Dr. Yaffee is a board-certified emergency medicine physician, who received an MD (2012) and MPH (2008) from the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, MI and completed her emergency medicine residency and chief residency (2015) at Emory University. Before returning to Emory as faculty, Dr. Yaffee served as a Lieutenant Commander in the United States Public Health Service and worked as an Epidemic Intelligence Service Officer for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Srinivas Murthy, MD CM, MHSc, FRCPC

Srinivas Murthy is a pediatric intensive care and infectious diseases physician at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver, Canada. His research and clinical interests are in improving the management of children and adults with severe infections.

Lindsey B. Gottlieb, MD

Lindsey Gottlieb is an Assistant Professor in the Division of Infectious Diseases at Emory University School of Medicine and the Hospital Epidemiologist at Emory University Hospital and Emory University Orthopaedics and Spine Hospital. As Hospital Epidemiologist, she collaborates with administrative staff to provide medical and operational direction to infection prevention and control activities. Her research focuses on transmission-based precautions implementation and efficacy, outbreak investigations, and reducing healthcare-associated infections. Lindsey is also a practicing infectious diseases physician, caring for patients in both the outpatient and inpatient settings.

Jill Morgan, RN, BSN

Jill Morgan earned her nursing degree from Georgia State University and has over thirty-five years of bedside nursing experience in emergency and critical care. She is on Emory's Serious Communicable Disease Unit team and cared for all five of Emory's viral hemorrhagic fever patients. She now serves as the site manager for the Emory biocontainment unit and has worked to validate the Unit's processes and protocols, including the inactivation of special pathogen waste and the safe doffing of complex PPE ensembles, and create the Healthcare Test Kitchen Lab.

Jill is a PPE subject matter expert and co-lead of the PPE Working Group for NETEC, where she also helps create and deliverfrontline education to healthcare workers, evaluates ensembles, protocols, and plans, and assess the readiness of healthcare facilities. She is a member of ASTM,



AAMI, ANSI, and APIC. In 2023, Jill was appointed to the National Academies Committee on Personal Protective Equipment.
